24 My name is Sandra Kissam. And I'm  
25 the President of Stewart Park and Reserve

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Coalition, SPARC. And some of you may be familiar with our mission, which is to save the Stewart buffer lands west of Drewey Lane.

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And I'm here not because I'm terribly familiar with the project, I have some sense of it, but mainly because I want to add my comments to your scope document, and hopefully you will include them.

We feel that it is very important that the environmental studies include the impacts on Stewart Airport, the Stewart buffer lands, and the surrounding communities of Montgomery, New Windsor, Newburgh and Hamptonburgh and the City of Newburgh in particular. Those communities in particular.

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And that it study, for all of the alternatives that you may be putting forth, what the induced traffic and induced growth development, secondary development and induced pressure on infrastructure; water, sewer, roads and

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natural resources, and indeed economy of  
the surrounding communities and the  
airport.

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So I do plan to put this into a  
written memo. I understand that your  
comment period extends until March 4th.
